Nat'l Cmdr Letter

Dear Legion Family Members and Friends,

All of us have been struck by the recent string of horrific stories of preventable deaths of veterans, secret waiting lists and irresponsible bonuses for VA officials. Early investigations have been made. Blame has been assigned. Secretary Shinseki has stepped down. But none of those actions will necessarily fix the biggest problem, and my primary concern: Our veterans are not getting the best possible treatment from VA, which they have earned through their honorable service. The American Legion's long, proud history includes working in the 1920s to help create the U.S. Veterans Bureau, the precursor to today's Department of Veterans Affairs. Since then, the Legion has worked closely with the VA. Every day American Legion service officers assist veterans with their benefits claims. Every day Legionnaires volunteer at VA facilities. Every day The American Legion advocates on behalf of veterans.

A little more than 10 years ago, then-American Legion National Commander Ronald Conley initiated a series of interactions at VA facilities, which became known as <u>System Worth Saving visits</u>. Even with all the problems facing VA and our veterans, the system is still worth saving — perhaps now more than ever. That is why The American Legion is <u>returning to Phoenix next week</u> to launch a pilot program, a Veterans Crisis Command Center. The center, located at Post 1 in Phoenix, 364 N. 7th Ave., will open at noon June 10. At the center, American Legion staff members and volunteers will:

• Work on claims assistance with veterans and family members, including those veterans who may have died due to a lack of treatment.

• Assist veterans wishing to enroll in VA health care.

• Provide grief counseling to veterans suffering from conditions such as depression and family members who have lost loved ones due to VA's negligence.

• Connect those wishing to share their stories with the media to reporters.

It is important to note that the Veterans Crisis Command Center is a pilot program. One look at the <u>Legion's</u> <u>map titled Epidemic of VA Mismanagement</u> demonstrates how widespread this problem has become. The Legion's Veterans Crisis Command Center will visit other VA facilities, working face-to-face with veterans and their family members. At some point, the media and nation's attention will shift away from the VA story. But

The American Legion will not waver. We've been there for veterans from the start of the Paris Caucus nearly a century ago. And we will continue to advocate on behalf of all veterans — past, present and future.

Pro Bono Info

Lawyers4Vets - Monthly Pro Bono Veterans Legal Clinic

Introduction: As a service to area Veterans, the South Carolina Appleseed Legal Justice Center has partnered with the Wm. Jennings Bryan Dorn VA Medical Center and members of the private bar to establish Lawyers 4 Vets, a Pro Bono Veterans Legal Clinic.

Purpose:

Lawyers 4 Vets connects low income and homeless Veterans with attorneys who provide legal advice and representation on certain issues.

Legal Issues and Services: The clinic will ONLY address the following topics:

- Obtaining identification (Social Security, South Carolina State ID, birth certificates)
- Child support and visitation issues (in South Carolina)
- Expungements and pardons (for convictions from South Carolina courts)
- Consumer protection
- Simple wills and healthcare power of attorney

Eligibility:

Veterans will be screened for eligibility, and if eligible will be given an appointment at the clinic. Lawyers 4 Vets will assist eligible Veterans regardless of military discharge status.

Appointments: Veterans who would like to be screened for eligibility should call the number listed below and leave a message including their name, phone number, and legal issue. The Veteran will be contacted within 2 business days by an intake volunteer who will ask the veteran a number of questions to determine if they are eligible. If the Veteran is eligible and has a qualifying legal issue, they will be given the next available appointment at the legal clinic. Appointments are required for a Veteran to receive a face-to-face meeting with a lawyer. Walk-ins will not be seen and will be directed to contact the telephone intake.
